Description



It consists of a lead frame which is surrounded with a white thermoplast. The reflector inside this package is filled up with clear epoxy.








Figure 2 Forward Current vs. Ambient Temperature



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


Figure 3 Rel. Luminous Intensity vs. Angular Displacement




Figure 4 Forward Current vs. Forward Voltage




Figure 5 Rel. Luminous Intensity vs. Ambient Temperature




Figure 6 Specific Luminous Intensity vs. Forward Current




Figure 7 Relative Luminous Intensity vs. Forward Current





Figure 8 Relative Luminous Intensity vs. Wavelength










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PCB Layout in mm

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Ozone Depleting Substances Policy Statement

It is the policy of Vishay Semiconductor GmbH to

- 1. Meet all present and future national and international statutory requirements.

- 2. Class I and II ozone depleting substances in the Clean Air Act Amendments of 1990 by the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) in the USA
- 3. Council Decision 88/540/EEC and 91/690/EEC Annex A, B and C (transitional substances) respectively.

Vishay Semiconductor GmbH can certify that our semiconductors are not manufactured with ozone depleting substances and do not contain such substances.
